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MR. MICHAEL KALUZNIAK: All right. Good evening, everybody. Thank you for showing up here in our virtual meeting. My name is Michael Kaluzniak. I'm a staff person with the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission.

This is a public information and environmental report scoping meeting for the Brookings-to-Hampton transmission line second circuit project. We're joined virtually tonight. We'll be in Marshall at the Everspring Hotel and Event Center at 6:00 p.m. tomorrow, if you care to join us.

This meeting is about a second circuit stringing on a portion of the previously-permitted Brookings-to-Hampton line. I won't go too deeply into the project itself. Mr. Tim Rogers from Xcel will be explaining that more after I finish my presentation here.

There's a requirement for a certificate of need for the project, and as well as a minor alteration that I'll talk to you about in a second here. The meeting here is to provide you an opportunity to ask questions and provide any comments that you might have about the need for the project, its potential impacts, and any methods that

we might use to mitigate, minimize, and avoid any of those potential impacts.

After I turn it over to Tim, then Suzanne Steinhauer from the Department of Commerce will be moderating the remainder of the seminar during the Q-and-A after a presentation about their role in the project.

The Public Utilities Commission is a five-member body. I'm a staff person at the Commission. We do all of our business publicly. All of our official meetings and hearings are public and available for anybody to attend. We do have all of our record docket information, applications, presentations, and so forth online here.

Let's see, this proposed transmission line is a project that requires a certificate of need because it is a transmission line that's over 1,500 feet, capable of operating at more than 200 kilovolts.

As I mentioned, this line that runs from Brookings to Hampton -- basically the South Dakota border to south of the Twin Cities -- was previously permitted by the Commission in 2012, if I remember correctly. And a portion of that was strung with a second circuit at the time of construction, or

shortly thereafter, and, currently, the remainder of it would be used for a second circuit. So the existing structures would be used for that second circuit for the most part. There's a couple changes we have as well.

A certificate of need process is reviewed under a comment -- a formal comment and review process that's included in the statutes and rules here that I've cited. As I mentioned, copies of this presentation will be made available online.

The project also requires a minor alteration for the portions that will be modified under our minor alteration process. A minor alteration is one that does not result in significant change in human or environmental impact of the facility.

The Commission authorized preparation of an environmental report in its October 10th Order accepting the application as complete. That acceptance does not constitute an approval in any sense. It's just -- it's a determination that there's sufficient information in the applications to go on.

Going forward with the process, the Commission will -- after doing these meetings will

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have the Department of Commerce prepare an environmental report for the certificate of need, and any comments you may have, they may include in that.

After that time, we'll be back in the project areas again. Basically repeating these meetings, once again, both in the project area and remotely via the Webex platform here, to collect your information if you have comments or questions about the project itself and the environmental report.

Let's see here, after that time, we will have an Administrative Law Judge report summarizing the project to-date and the hearing comments, including your comments here tonight, and we do appreciate receiving all of those. Once the ALJ report -- the Administrative Law Judge report -comes in, I'll do a briefing paper, and then the Commission will decide shortly thereafter on the project and include any permit requirements as they deem necessary.

Let's see here, we anticipate having the public hearing sometime around March of next year, of 2024.

And we should be good there.

I should note that the comments for the environmental report scoping are due January 3rd. So if you carry away nothing from tonight's meeting, please remember that the comments are due at that time. So we'd appreciate hearing from you. Suzanne's presentation has more information about how to do that, how to submit comments.

The notice of this meeting was posted to the Commission's website, our eDockets that you can find via our website, MN.gov/PUC. We also have our contact information here. If you care to reach us at any time, please feel free to do so. My phone number and e-mail are there. Jacques Harvieux is the public advisor for the Commission on this matter, and the Commission's website is here as well. And I'll try to upload this presentation as soon as I can after the meeting here.

So with that, I think I will turn it over to Mr. Rogers who will have some information about the project itself. Thank you for coming out.

MR. TIM ROGERS: Thank you, Mike.

Hi. I'm Tim Rogers. I'm manager in the siting and land rights group at Xcel Energy. My group takes care of the permitting and land control for our projects. I'm also joined by Tony Wendland,

our project manager for this project.

Xcel Energy, we are the lead utility. We are leading the application for this project, but I do want to note that there are other CapX owners on this line that you can see on the screen there.

We're here to ask approval from the Commission to install a second-circuit 345-kilovolt line on the existing structures that are capable of that second circuit already. There's two distinct segments to this project: An eastern and a western segment. In total, it's about a 98-mile project.

We'll let Mike -- very good.

The western segment goes from Brookings

County substation -- which is in White, South

Dakota -- to the Lyon County substation in Milroy,

Minnesota. The eastern segment goes from

New Prague, Minnesota, to Hampton, Minnesota.

So in 2012, I think, the Commission approved us to build these structures with the second set of davit arms already in place. So when the time comes to hang a second circuit, we won't have to do as much construction. It will all be set for us.

However, at the time we needed -- we need to hang that second circuit, the Commission asked

the owners to come back with data showing is -showing the time -- or the need for -- is it the
right time to put on that second circuit? So the
time is now. We have been experiencing congestion
on this line, which has been inhibiting us from
delivering the renewable energy to our customers.
So that's what this is all about, is getting in
front of the Commission to show that now is the
time. We have a need for this second circuit.

Here are some more details on the actual project. You can see the segments on each end in red. That's the two segments that we need to hang that second circuit on. You'll notice in the middle is a purple segment. The Commission allowed the owners to build and operate a double-circuit 345-kV line in that middle section. So we're just kind of -- we're completing this project. Once it's done, we'll have a double-circuit 345-kilovolt line.

We plan to use a helicopter to install the second set of conductors. All the work will be within the existing easements. We will have some areas where we'll need the crews to, you know, use a bucket truck to get up to those structures. So in those areas, we will have some temporary impacts from the access routes and the work areas around

those structures. Any impacts to crops will be reimbursed.

You can -- let's see, what you have now is -- you can back up there, Mike. Yeah. Thanks.

So that's that -- the western segment. Those little areas in red are the areas where we'll have some temporary impacts. We'll have some access routes in the work areas. The construction on the western segment is expected to begin Quarter 2 of next year, of 2024.

And there's going to be one structure we'll have to put a new -- put an additional structure in when this line cuts into that Steep Bank Lake substation.

Next slide, Mike.

Here's the eastern segment. It's pretty much the same situation: Helicopter install, all within existing easements. There will be newer -- new structures that have to be installed, about 11 or so. And that's, again, because we have to cut into the Chub Lake substation, that will need one or two new structures. And then you can see south of this airport lake -- Airlake Airport, we have to have some lower-profile, shorter structures, and so

1	that will cause us to, kind of, move about ten or
2	nine or ten structures.
3	The eastern segment, we're expecting to
4	begin construction in 2025.
5	And I think that's it, Mike.
6	The next slide has got if you need any
7	more information on the project or you need to
8	contact us, the information is here.
9	And with that, I will turn it over to
10	Suzanne.
11	MS. SUZANNE STEINHAUER: Thanks, Tim.
12	Good evening. My name is Suzanne
13	Steinhauer. I'm here with the Minnesota Department
14	of Commerce, Energy Environmental Renew and Analysis
15	Division.
16	And you can go to the next slide.
17	The Department of Commerce has a number
18	of responsibilities, most of which fall under the,
19	sort of, general area of consumer protection. We
20	have an insurance fraud division, rate paper I'm
21	sorry, ratepayer advocacy, and also weights and
22	measures.
23	Our role at the EERA is to act as
24	technical advisors to the Commission in order to
25	provide neutral, third-party analyzes of potential

human and environmental impacts for projects that are seeking a permit from the Commission. We don't advocate. We try to focus on the facts and make those available to the Commission and to all participants. The goal is informed decision-making by the Commission and information for all participants.

You can move ahead.

So I think we covered this. The project, as proposed, needs two approvals from the Commission: The certificate of need and the minor alteration.

Moving ahead, with respect to my responsibility, which is environmental review, the difference is that the certificate of need proceedings require an environmental report; whereas, the minor alteration doesn't have a separate environmental review document. The review is incorporated into the process.

Next slide.

So the environmental report describes the proposed project and system alternatives. System alternatives to the proposed project are related to the size, type, and timing to meet the identified need for the project. We will assess the potential

human and environmental impacts from the proposed project and system alternatives, and identify strategies to avoid and mitigate those impacts.

So any infrastructure project is going to have impacts on humans and the environment, and the job of the environmental report is to put those in perspective. So one of the alternatives will be not building the project, which will also have environmental and human impacts.

Next slide, please.

So the environmental report will look at a number of things. It will look at the alternatives, including a no-build; transmission lines of a different size or type; why can or can't you do generation instead of transmission; and it will look for all of those identified alternatives. It will look at the impacts of mitigation measures to natural resources, which includes air quality, greenhouse gases, vegetation, wildlife, geology, soils and water; human settlement, including aesthetics, noise, socioeconomics, cultural resources, public services, communications, health and safety, and environmental justice; and then land-based economies, including agriculture, and to the extent practicable, forestry, mining,

recreation, and tourism.

Next slide, please.

So with that in mind, the public comments help us focus and develop the alternatives and inform the analysis for the proposed project in the environmental report. We use this scoping process to move from the "general" to the "specific." What is it about this particular project in this particular place? And we use that also to inform our recommendations as to permit conditions that could minimize or avoid those impacts.

Next slide, please.

So with that, sort of, general background in mind, I'd ask that you try to, to the extent possible, focus the scoping comments on potential impacts, human and environmental; strategies to avoid, minimize, or mitigate the potential impacts; other ways that the need for the project could be met; unique characteristics of the proposed route or the project; items that are missing or mischaracterized in either of the applications; and then, just generally, other project-related issues or concerns.

Next slide, please.

So we're taking comments this afternoon.

We're taking verbal comments today. There is a court reporter, so we'll have a record of that. And then as Mike mentioned, we have a meeting in Marshall tomorrow night, and those are the three opportunities to provide oral comments.

Comments -- written comments, we're accepting through January 3rd, those go to me. You can comment online on the Commerce website. There's a fillable form. You can mail, fax, or e-mail a comment to me, and as long as I get it by the end of day on January 3rd, that will be part of the record.

so in just a minute we'll open comments up, but I want to go over, real briefly, just some of the -- so the ground rules. As I mentioned, we have a court reporter. It's really important that we have an accurate record of who's speaking, so we'll ask one speaker at a time. We'll ask the speaker to state and spell your name for the court reporter.

Try to direct your comments and questions to the scope of the ER, but there's also an opportunity to ask questions. If you have questions about the project, I'd recommend -- I'd advise you to do that tonight. We have people here who should be able to answer your question. We'll limit the

initial comments to five minutes or less. 1 2 doesn't look like there's a whole lot of people, so 3 we want to get to everybody. And then, finally, maintain respect for others. People can have 4 5 different opinions on the same project. So that said, I will open it for 6 7 comments. 8 MR. MICHAEL KALUZNIAK: Just a reminder, 9 if you care to speak or have a comment, please raise your hand using the hand feature, or press *3 on 10 your phone, and we can line you up for a comment. 11 12 We don't seem to have anybody who's got their hand raised for comments. 13 Once again, while we're sitting here, on 14 the left-hand side of this screen there is a survey 15 that the Commission has started using at all of our 16 17 public meetings and hearings, and there's a QR code 18 there that you can screen. 22	MR. GEORGE VINSON: I just wasn't sure
