To the Public Utilities Commission and staff,

I live in Minneapolis, I am a renter, and a customer of Centerpoint Energy. My comments are for docket #21-377.

#21-377

For the following reasons I ask that the commission approve the proposal to create a pilot Inclusive Financing Program through Centerpoint Energy's billing system with several fundamental changes to the initial proposal made by Centerpoint.

As a renter, I face significant obstacles to implementing energy efficiency improvements to my apartment. I am not in a position to make any such upgrades by myself, as I do not own the property. My landlord is incentivized only to meet the minimum requirements for heating, with no added incentive to increase the building's energy efficiency since the utility bills are paid by myself and the other tenants. Under this model, my energy bills will remain high, and I will have to continue using an excessive amount of energy just to keep my apartment at a comfortable temperature. Not only is this a waste of money, the excess energy required for heating results in higher greenhouse gas emissions. I know that buildings account for a very large portion of ghg emissions in Minnesota, so it is essential that the commission take urgent action to increase building energy efficiency.

An inclusive financing program would allow myself and many other Minnesotans to access options for increasing the energy efficiency of our homes. The current status quo, in which wealthy homeowners who can afford it or low income households who qualify for assistance programs are the bulk of homes benefiting from upgrades, simply excludes too many of us in the middle. Inclusive financing provides access for renters as well as those homeowners who do not fit the established model I have described here.

However, there are several key changes that must be made to Centerpoint's proposed program before the pilot can be launched:

1. Ensure that Centerpoint uses a Pay-As-You-Save model of inclusive financing and the consumer protections included therein

2. Remove the \$100 up front copay, which is not included in any of the Inclusive Financing programs that have been successful in other states

3. Pursue a low-cost capital source other than Centerpoint's 8% proposal, which inflates program

costs unnecessarily .

Thank you for your consideration, and I strongly urge you to approve the Inclusive Financing pilot through Centerpoint with the changes outlined above.

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I've noticed some information in the record in this docket (M-21-377) about electric cooperatives in other states operating TOBF programs for their member-consumers. While I obviously support those electric coops working to help their members reduce their energy costs and energy bills, the situation in Minnesota is much different, and therefore the application of TOBF here would be much different. Our building stock is different from those other states, our climate is different, our statutory framework for energy efficiency is different, and utilities in Minnesota have been implementing utility Conservation Improvement Plan (CIP) programs for going on 30 years. Here in Minnesota, we have developed a time-tested cost-effectiveness, program approval and vendor training infrastructure for CIP that utilities and their customers can rely on. Therefore, I would urge the MN PUC to discount much of what they have heard about the TOBF experience of electric cooperatives in other states – it's not really applicable here in Minnesota. Thank you.
