thrown around by those advoca ing for a solar mandate. If a TV reporter says wind is free or tha the sun is free, then there must be no downside, right? What ge lost when we use catchy phrases is meaningful discussion on the merits of whether solar energy i a reliable producer of energy an whether you can afford it.

In my opinion, solar energy is not yet reliable enough and st way too costly for state legislators to impose a heavy-handed mandate. Simply stated, propose solar legislation (HF 956, SF 90] at the state Capitol would cost Minnesotans hundreds of millic of dollars for an energy source that only works when the sun is shining. Large-scale batteries are still prohibitively expensive. Just as troubling, this legislation adds another tax burden onto ye that most likely will be used to fund solar installations for uppe income earners who can already afford to install solar panels.
