> Re: CenturyLink Response to Stillwater Township Comments In the Matter of a Petition for a Rulemaking Regarding Minnesota Rules

Chapter 7810 Docket No. P-421/M-21-381

Dear Mr. Seuffert:

I am writing to respond to comments submitted by representatives of Stillwater Township regarding their CenturyLink services, specifically Internet service in the Township. While we understand their frustration with the limited broadband deployment within the Township boundary, the comments submitted have little to do with voice services and the 40-year-old service quality rules that CenturyLink proposes revising. Instead, the comments appear to be an effort to leverage this docket for improving broadband services to the approximately 800 living units in the township. Such an effort is ironic, given that the rules CenturyLink seeks to change prioritize voice repair over broadband, something that was unforeseen 40 years ago.

Broadband Challenges in Stillwater Township

The primary challenges to deploying broadband in Stillwater Township are population density and terrain. According to Census data, Stillwater Township has a little more than 800 living units and a population of just over 2,000 spread across 17.5 square miles. Many of the residents live on large lots located off primary roads which further increases the cost to deploy.

CenturyLink Has Been Responsive

CenturyLink is aware of the Township's interest in broadband and has responded to requests to meet in person. CenturyLink representatives have been in contact with members of the Board Supervisors and other residents to address questions and attend a meeting. In addition, CenturyLink engineers and network planners have spent time and resources reviewing the Township footprint, identified the location of CenturyLink customers and examined the costs of building a fiber-to the-home network within the Township. Unfortunately, what we learned was that the economics of such a build are cost prohibitive, even with a state broadband grant awarding 50 percent of the cost -- the maximum amount allowed by statute.

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Response to Comments

Commenters raised two other issues we'd like to address. First, a commenter raises anecdotal issues about voice service. Nothing in this docket will change CenturyLink's obligation to repair service when a customer is experiencing trouble. This docket is about managing the workload technicians have each day and prioritizing work in the best interest of all customers, not just the voice customer. Second, a letter writer minimizes the performance of wireless service through an anecdotal comment. It is important to note that the Commission found the Stillwater wire center to be competitive in 2016 and that test included wireless capabilities. I would also note that four of the five township supervisors list what appears to be a wireless telephone number as their primary contact on the Township website, www.stillwatertownship.com.

CenturyLink Investment in Stillwater Township

CenturyLink is making investments in the Stillwater area. CenturyLink has deployed broadband in parts of Stillwater Township through the FCC Connect America Fund (CAF) program. Through CAF and CenturyLink's own investment, 263 living units in the western portion of the township are able to receive a broadband connection. In addition to the CAF funding, another \$300,000 was spent on fiber and core projects supporting the deployment. Further, in 2021 CenturyLink has three network "rehab" projects planned for completion in Stillwater Township. The project locations are on Stonebridge Trail, Arcola Trail and Square Lake Trail. The three projects replace cable, repair splices and repair damaged pedestals that have deteriorated or been damaged and will improve voice quality in those locations.
